A Note from the Historian:

A Spirit of Community

Sometime around 1943 community canneries were awarded to fifty communities in Tennessee by the United States government. Among the fifty winners, Chapel Hill received a sausage grinder, a sealer, a canner, a dehydrating plant, and other miscellaneous equipment but was required to provide a building to house the equipment.

The December 13, 1943 issue of the school paper, The Wizard, contained an article entitled "Chapel Hill Receives Cannery; Box Supper Helps on Building" that reported Forrest students along with the P.T.A. held a box supper to raise funds for the building. While this article was interesting it was another article alongside this one that quickly caught my attention.

I believe that the following article printed in its entirety exemplifies a sense of community spirit held by the students of that day. The students' pride and belief that they could make a difference in their community and in their world is a tribute to the parents and teachers of those students. The "greatest generation" is often seen as a group somewhere 'out there' when in reality they were found in the confines of Forrest School.

"F.H.S. Students Go Cotton Picking"

On Friday morning, November 12th, ninety-three F.H.S. students and teachers fished out overalls, old sweaters and shoes so they would be prepared for whatever they met. What they met were acres of cotton as the students and teachers of F.H.S. had promised to pick cotton, which would otherwise have been destroyed in the bombing area. The money received is to help provide a building to house a community cannery given by the government to the Chapel Hill community.

The first bus of students got there about 8:30 and started picking cotton. The other two bus loads came on a little later.

By 11 o'clock the first three patches were picked out and we were ready for another ride on further into the bombing area and another field of cotton.

When Mr. Scott's bus got there with lunch, everybody was ready to eat a mile a minute. We picked out two more patches in the afternoon and were ready to leave the bombing range behind by 5 o'clock. We had 4,970 pounds of cotton to our credit.

On November 23, we started for another day of cotton picking. Back in the bombing area we went, to come out again that afternoon with 4,260 pounds of cotton. The total receipt for the first day was \$410.03 and the second day \$340.80. Our total was \$750.83 with approximately \$500.00 clear to put on the building for the cannery.

CORD MCLEAN AWARDED ALUMNI SCHOLARSHIP TO STUDY ABROAD

Cord McLean, valedictorian of the Class 2005, is currently a junior at Rhodes College in Memphis. He is majoring in Anthropology/ Sociology with a minor in African American Studies. At Rhodes he has served as President of the Black Student Association, as a Peer Assistant to incoming first-year students, and as Volunteer Coordinator for PeaceJam. He has a 3.75 cumulative G.P.A. and was recently initiated into the Torch Chapter of Mortar Board. This summer, Cord has been offered the opportunity to study abroad in Arcadia University's 2008 Community Development Program in Cape Town, South Africa. While there, he will be taking a course in sociology on the conceptual issues around development, poverty, and power, as well as on the theories and practices of community development in the context of post-apartheid South Africa. The estimated cost for Cord's six week experience, including tuition, room and board, books, meals, local travel, roundtrip airfare, and student visa, is \$10,000.

At the May alumni executive meeting, the council voted to donate \$1,000 in scholarship to Cord's summer abroad experience.
