There is no more beloved citizen of Chapel Hill than former Forrest teacher, coach, and principal Norman Henson. He spent more than a decade helping shape young people at Forrest, earning the respect of not only students but also all the community.

The Class of 1963 (this reunion's honored class of fifty years) should remember him well. It was in their senior year that Norman was named Forrest High's head coach of football and boys' and girls' basketball. In his first year, he was named D.R.V.C. Football Coach of the Year. Coach Tom Wigington was his assistant.

Norman became principal at Forrest in 1965 and resigned in 1973. From '73 until retirement in 1996, he was Director of Human Resources and Personnel at Red Cedar Pencil, which later became Cosmolab.

Perhaps helping Norman to settle into the Chapel Hill community was marrying a hometown girl, Mary Margaret McCormick. They reared two fine children, Jimmy and Jennifer, who have blessed them with a total of five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Norm and Mary Margaret naturally follow their

grandchildren in sports and the various activities in which they participate.

Norman had a "close call" in 2007 when he had an aneurysm. He is eighty now and moves a bit slower, but he attends the Forrest High Reunion each August. If he's able, I bet you'll see him there again this year.

Norman Henson left the field of education forty years ago, but most folks around Chapel Hill still refer to him as "Coach." He'll always be "Coach" to me!

**MEMORIES OF FORREST HIGH
SCHOOL AND LIFE THERE AFTER**

Dr. Milton White Neathery

I went through high school during the World War II years of 1942-46. I was president of the senior class of 1946. Our school, with Mr. Nunley as principal, was very patriotic. I don't remember who came up with the idea of collection scrap iron as a project. I thought the freshman class won but I was corrected as someone Brought in a large farm instrument with a heavy weight. The pile was larger enough to block out the view of the school. A celebration was held at the end and Governor Jim McCord came and gave a speech.

Another project evolved picking cotton. The government fought some land, which was planted in cotton for a practice bombing range. Our school suspended two days of classes to go pick the cotton. I dearly hated picking cotton but I went anyway. James Brown of my class was cotton king but I don't remember who was cotton queen.

We had a basketball team for each of the four years and football only my senior year. Mr. Cooper, a math teacher, was our coach. We played six games and lost them all. Mr. Nunley substituted as our basketball coach one time. We were in practice and I was running down the middle of the floor and his whistle went sliding across the floor. The team, including me, gathered around him and with my knees knocking, I was literally scared to death. I will never forget what he said. With a grin he said, "You know it is too dangerous to be safe around here." Word got out that I knocked the principal down.

Another instance involved Mr. Nunley. Mrs. Jernigan was putting the biology test on the board. There was a window over the door. Bill Van Cleave and I got a bench to stand on to see the test. Mr. Nunley came along and caught us. He said "Boys grab this bench and carry it down the hall, up the steps and repeat the cycle until I tell you to stop." People in the study hall noticed us but after about six times, they began to wonder what was going on. Mr. Nunley was a great principal and I respected him very much.

After graduation, I had a big decision to make. I knew I didn't want to make a living picking cotton. I wanted to go to college but the odds of going were very great. But my will to go was very strong. I had a \$250.00 scholarship from my 4-H Club work. I had a job waiting for me at UT. In August of 1946, a

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little skinny boy of nineteen put what clothes he had in a pasteboard suitcase, tied it with a belt, and fully intended to hitch hike to Knoxville to go to the University of Tennessee. I was lucky. Mr. Charlie Kerr (Beth Chunn's father) heard about it and said he was going to Knoxville and I could go with him. I stayed in a room over the milking parlor. I had an army cot for my bed and a card table for my desk. I got twenty-five cents an hour for milking the cows, and all the milk I could drink. After one year, I looked for other jobs and what I made from them and the sale of calves from my show cow back home took care of my finances. After four years of hard work, perseverance and by the grace of God, I received my BS degree in Dairy Science. May years later, May 1998, I would be invited to deliver the commencement exercise to the graduating seniors at FHS. I consider this my greatest honor of my professional career. In August of 1950, I went to Knoxville to graduate. My daddy and mamma, which never went out of the county much, rode a bus to Knoxville to see their son graduate. I told Marie that the Army had called me up. She said in that case before you go we must get married. She got permission from Nursing School and that is what we did. I had a job at Inglewood Farms owned by Mr. L.H. Haltom. I was in charge of his swine and dairy projects. We lived in a tenant house with three rooms and a path. It was the coldest

winter ever at fifteen below zero! I did not go into the service until May of 1951. My service during the Korean War was two years of active duty plus six years of inactive reserve.

After I got out of the Army in 1953, I went to work at Nashville Pure Milk Company as a field man. Marie worked at Vanderbilt Hospital. After two years, I went back to UT to work on my Masters Degree on the GI Bill. Marie worked in Fort Sanders Hospital where she got her training as a RN. Our son was born in 1955. I received my MS degree in Dairy Science in December 1955. We moved to Blaisville, Georgia to work at the Georgia Mountain Experiment Station. There I did research with sheep and dairy cows. We were there thirteen years.

In 1969, we moved to Athens, Georgia where I joined the faculty in the Animal and Dairy Science Department. My job there was for teaching and research. My research was the field of Trace Minerals. I was allowed to take four credit hours of course work each quarter. I received my PhD in Animal Nutrition in 1973. As I drove in to work each morning, I passed a cotton patch. I would look at the cotton and say to myself "I don't care what I have to do today, it will beat picking cotton."

Marie and I retired from the University of Georgia in 1992 and 1991 respectively. We have enjoyed retired life on a small farm

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where we have a garden, orchard, and roses. WE became very interested in genealogy and have written a book - one for Logue (my mother's side) and on for the Neatherys of Marshall County. I feel like the Lord has blessed me to live long enough to see three great-grandsons.

**F.H.S. ALUMNI APPLYING FOR
501(c)(3)**

A few years ago the Bill Gabard Estate left to the Forrest Alumni Association a generous gift of \$110,000, the interest from the money to fund scholarships. With such a sizeable gift the alumni leadership recognized we may longer be viewed by the I.R.S. as a small insignificant organization. We had more money in our interest

bearing accounts than ever before (FYI yet rates are yielding little).

It was decided that we seek non-profit status, and we have begun the process with the help of a C.P.A. and attorney. The "Determination Letter" from the I.R.S. cited our original by-laws of 1988 and scholarship memorandum of 1993 having elements that would likely disqualify us from becoming tax exempt.

We will take a moment at the reunion asking "the alumni body" to approve the amending (perhaps re-writing) our documents 1988 and 1993.

Perry Piper will also be joining us at the reunion. Mr. Piper has been an Assistant United States Attorney in Chattanooga (Eastern District of Tennessee) since 1999. He was formerly the Supervisory Assistant in the office. He then came into work one day and decided he no longer wanted to be in low-level management. He abruptly resigned from those duties. Currently, Mr. Piper handles general and white collar crimes (bank fraud, mail fraud, wire fraud, cock-fighting), violent crimes, immigration crimes, and narcotics cases (primarily methamphetamine and cocaine cases, with a sprinkling of marijuana thrown in). Piper lives on Signal Mountain, Tennessee, with his current wife Julie and their several cats and a dog. In his spare time he enjoys St. Louis Cardinals baseball, University of Tennessee football and basketball, mowing the lawn and bird watching. Piper also exercises occasionally, mostly by jumping to conclusions, pushing sixty and running down the boss.

**CHAPEL HILL ELEMENTARY
UPDATE**

Chapel Hill Elementary School has had another great school year. Despite the fact, we faced many challenges and changes in education with the implementation of several new state and federal guidelines. As always, our CHES family pulled together and made great progress with our children. CHES had the honor of presenting 96 Kindergarten students and 135

fifth grade students their graduation diplomas. For their academic excellence, 56 students were inducted into the Beta Club. In addition to our students being honored, her peers selected Ms. Shannon Carlton Brown as CHES Teacher of the Year. Ms. Brown is a third grade teacher and a 1990 Forrest graduate. Ms. Brown has shown such an incredible inner strength and positive attitude as she has taught this school year while battling breast cancer. Our prayers are with Ms. Shannon Carlton Brown as she continues her fight.

It's hard to believe that seventeen years have passed since Chapel Hill Elementary School first opened its doors to grades Kindergarten thru fifth grade. With each year that has passed, our school, community, and town have grown. For the 2012-2013 school year, Chapel Hill Elementary School had 710 students enrolled. Although our elementary school is the largest in the county, we have exhausted all uses of space for faculty, staff, and students. For this reason, a new Intermediate School has been proposed. It would be located on the property adjacent to Chapel Hill Elementary School on the south side. The building plan proposed would house grades 4-6 with 24 classrooms alleviating the overflow of students at CHES and Forrest School, but also providing room for the projected growth for the next 10 years. The budgetary plan projects the cost of the new

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school to be approximately 10.97 million dollars. However, this school is greatly needed to accommodate the growth of both our schools. Our Director of Schools, Mrs. Jackie Abernathy, and the Marshall County School Board members are working hard to have the funding approved so construction can start in the near future. Former Forrest graduates, Mr. Harvey Jones Jr. and Mr. Randy Perryman are our district school board representatives that have been working diligently to help our school system.

Chapel Hill Elementary School has welcomed several new faculty and staff members. Mrs. Melissa Hopkins is our new school nurse. Mrs. Hopkins is married to 1990 Forrest graduate, Richard Hopkins, and they have two little girls. Our cafeteria welcomed several new workers: Ms. Trudy Brooks, Jessica Hughes, Dottie Lowe, and Shawna Ryan. Mr. Bob Long has joined our staff with the difficult task of crossing guard. His lovely wife, Diane, who requested our assistance in getting him out of the house, referred Mr. Long to his position. Mrs. Long- we appreciate your referral! Mr. Long does a fantastic job safely directing parents as they drop off or pick up their children daily. 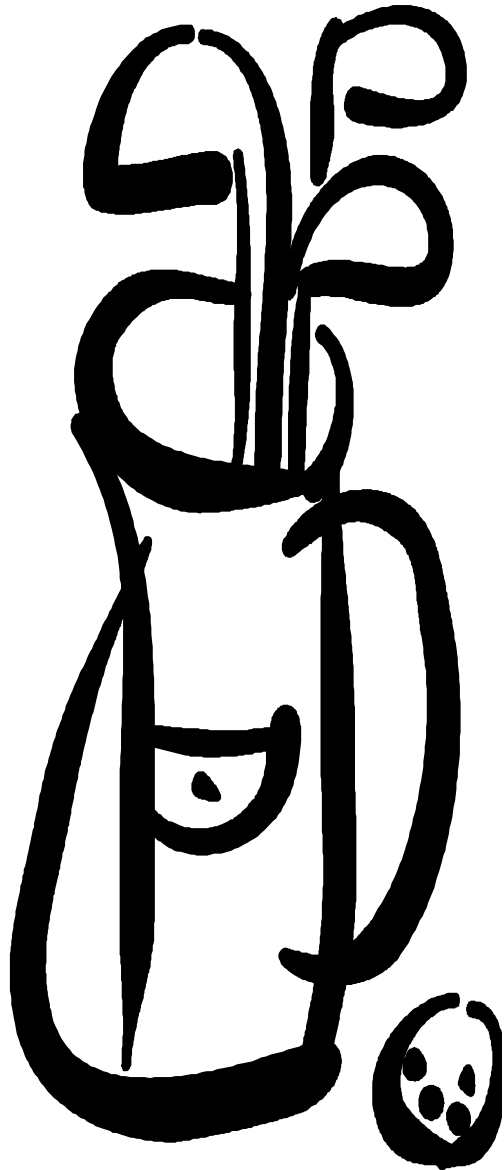
